

9th May 1932.

The Annual meeting of the Committee was held on the above date. Mr S. G. Ley presiding, when, in addition, the following were present: Messrs D. Adams, J. Jones (G), G. Adams, J. Jones (C), R. Stancombe, E. Lovismore and W. S. Root.

Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted; arising out of the minutes, secretary reported that he had failed to get exemption from the Land Tax, and he had, accordingly paid the amount (15/-)

In presenting a detailed financial statement up to, and including the 30th April last, secretary stated that unfortunately messrs D. Adams and B. Jenkins had been unable to act as Auditors, Mr G. Adams however had deputised and had seen all the necessary documents and bank books. As all the particulars are filed with the Institute, papers, it does not seem necessary to enter all details here. It may be noted that the period under review, viz Billiards

from Jan 1st 1931 to 30th April 1932, and the general activities from June 1931 to 30th April 1932 was a highly successful one. At time of meeting Overdraft at Bank stood at £11/14/10, and when other outstanding monies were paid in at the end of the week this would be reduced to £8/5/8, and there would still be 24/- outstanding in respect of strings by the Women's Institute. At the time of the Annual meeting in June 1931, the amount of Overdraft amounted to £36/3/4. The Report was considered highly satisfactory, and on the motion of Mr Ley seconded by Mr Coosmore a vote of thanks was unanimously accorded the Secretary and auditor.

Discussion then followed with regard to any work contemplated being done during the summer months, and eventually the following were decided upon.

1. Mr Eddie Rees be asked to give a price for building brick jambs at both entrances.
2. Tenders to be invited to complete the panelboarding of the ceiling - Advertised in local paper.

Mr E Lovemore was empowered to order two
lamps for heating Billiard Table.

This completed the business of the
Committee meeting which was then followed by
a general meeting of the members of the
Institute.
